CITY OKS DOWNTOWN WATERFRONT MUNICIPAL HARBOR PLAN, PAVING WAY FOR 600-FOOT HARBOR GARAGE TOWER

After years of debate and public meeting, the Boston Planning & Development Agency unanimously approved the draft downtown municipal harbor plan at its board meeting. The vote is a major step forward for real-estate developer Don Chiofaro of The Chiofaro Co., who has long proposed an iconic tower at the site of the Harbor Garage.

The city-approved plan outlines development guidelines for the 42-acre downtown waterfront area. It still requires state environmental approval, and the Chiofaro Co. would still need to file a development proposal. The development guidelines outlined in the plan allows for a 600-foot tower at the site with 50 % of the site required to be open space. It also allows for a 305-foot, 22-story

tower at the site of James Hook & Co. seafood restaurant on Northern Avenue, which would call for 30 percent of the lot as open space.

"This plan includes allowance for massings that do not necessarily resemble their neighbors, but can act in a stand-alone, iconic manner that could achieve multiple goals of the (downtown waterfront municipal harbor plan), and complement the broader urban context of the city in terms of light, shadow, quality of the public realm, and views to and from the waterfront," the city wrote in the document.

The plan includes a provision to "protect and promote the New England Aquarium as a water-dependent use" through an agreement between the aquarium, the city and Chiofaro. Chiofaro would also be required to contribute \$5 million toward creating a public open space at the Chart House parking lot at Long Wharf, as well as an additional \$5 million toward the Aquarium's vision for a waterfront version of the Greenway —which proponents call the Blueway — that would remove the IMAX theater from the waterfront.

Another provision in the plan would allow any existing building to elevate its flood-sensitive mechanical or utility systems to the top of a building. That could increase building heights by 30 feet, or up to two stories, and would require additional city approval.

WDC MEMBER SPOTLIGHT: A BETTER CITY & RICHARD DIMINO, PRESIDENT & CEO

Rick Dimino has been President and CEO of A Better City and its predecessor the Artery Business Committee since 1995 when the mission was to support the implementation of the Central Artery/Tunnel Project and to keep the city open for business during construction. Rick led the transition to A Better City in 2005 as the Artery work was being completed and the mission shifted to representing a diverse group of business and institutional leaders with the goal of enhancing Boston and the region's economic health, competitiveness, vibrancy, sustainability, and quality of life.

Appointed by Mayor Ray Flynn as Boston's Transportation Commissioner in the 1980s, Rick currently serves on several boards including the Boston Society of Architects, Trustee of Boston Harbor Now, Chairman Emeritus of the Metropolitan Area Planning Council, and Co-chair of Go Boston 2030.

ABC's 14-member staff focuses on three areas:

- 1. Transportation and infrastructure
- 2. Land use and development
- 3. Energy and the environment.

ABC, working with others, is engaged in monitoring, and advising MassDOT and the City on projects that include the I-90 Interchange redesign in Allston, Longfellow Bridge, and sustainability and resiliency projects. ABC is also conducting studies on transportation, placemaking, and sustainability issues.

Rick was instrumental in the creation of the Wharf District Council. He worked with its predecessor in preparing planning and design guidelines for the Wharf District open space and for monitoring the construction of the parks and establishment of the Conservancy. ABC is currently part of a group established by the Governor to identify a permanent funding solution to support the Rose Kennedy Greenway.

Members of A Better City and the Wharf District Council share a commitment to the quality of the Greenway as it supports the lives of people who live and work here.


WHAT IS 311?
