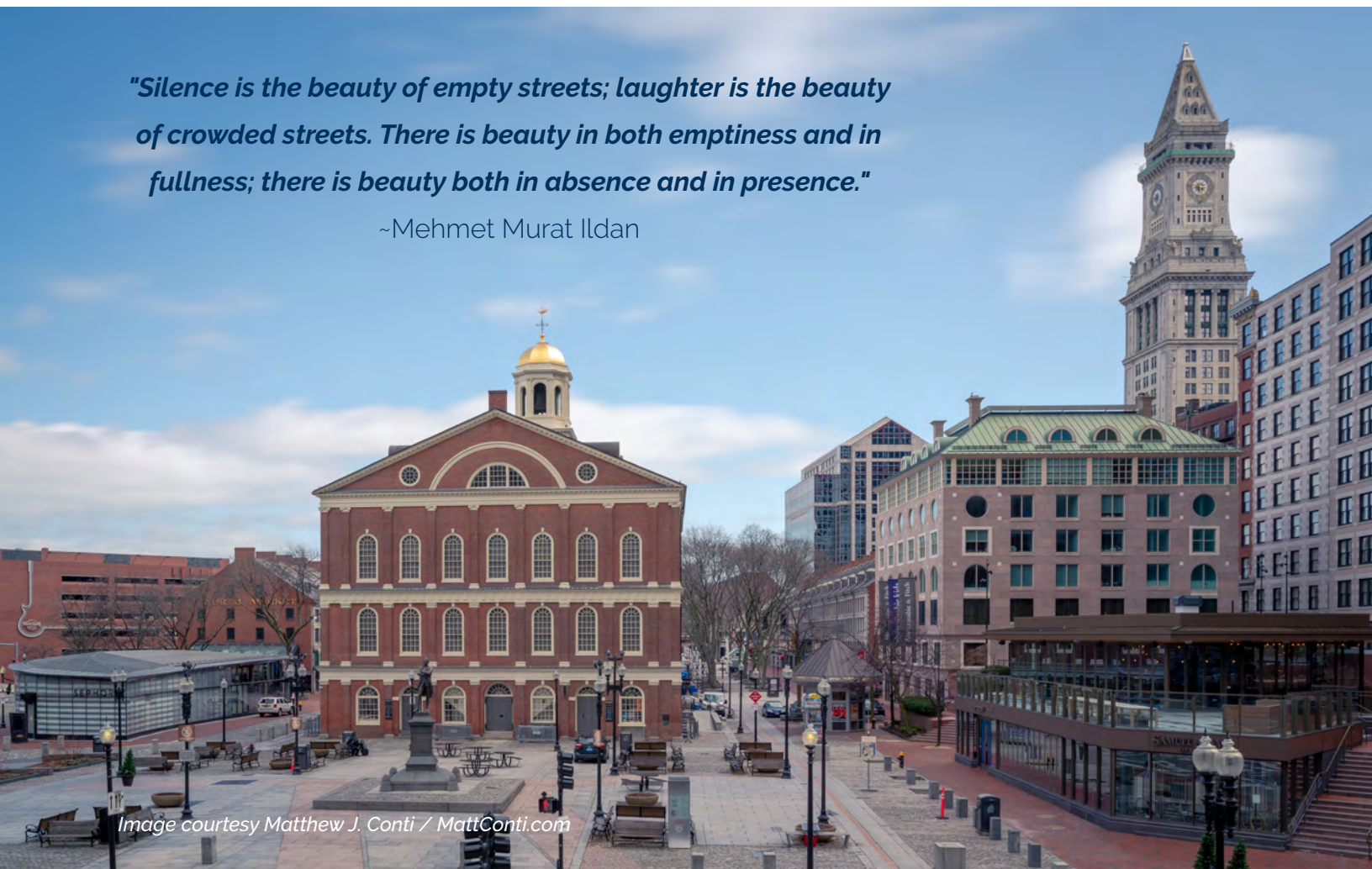

We would like to acknowledge and extend our sincerest thanks to all the special people who are fighting this enemy and who are keeping us going.



NEW ENGLAND AQUARIUM

The New England Aquarium invites everyone to stay connected to the wonders of the ocean with virtual and online educational programming for all ages.

While the Aquarium is temporarily closed to visitors, we continue to deliver critical care for our 20,000 marine animals. Staff are onsite daily at both the Aquarium and our Sea Turtle Hospital in Quincy, Mass.

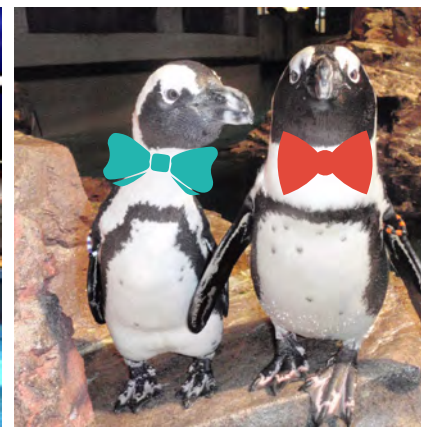
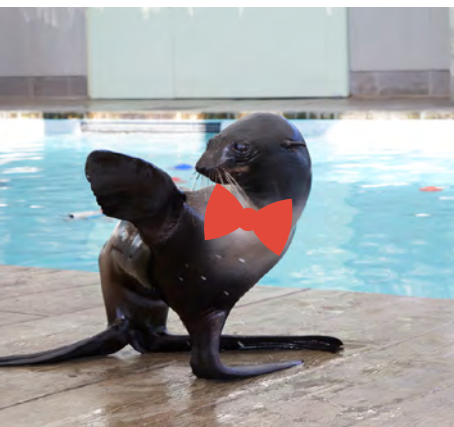
The aquarists who are taking care of our animals and our visitor educators are sharing videos featuring our animals and glimpses into life inside the Aquarium during our temporary closure. Join us on a morning dive in our Giant Ocean Tank or a feeding of Myrtle the green sea turtle. Learn how our marine mammal trainers taught our Atlantic harbor seals how to have their teeth brushed and nails clipped. And visit our Sea Turtle Hospital, where we rehabilitate sea turtles so we can release them back into the ocean. Hear from researchers in our Anderson Cabot Center for Ocean Life, National Geographic photographer and New England Aquarium Explorer-in-Residence Brian Skerry, and Marine Conservation Action Fund Fellows, leaders in ocean conservation from around the world.

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ROSE KENNEDY GREENWAY

Maintaining a healthy Greenway is a central part of the [Greenway Conservancy's mission](#). As we all practice physical distancing during this challenging time, we hope access to the outdoors can be a comfort.

The Conservancy is closely monitoring the evolving coronavirus (COVID-19) situation, and has made changes to our day-to-day operations and care of the park, including:

- » Increasing the frequency of cleaning and disinfecting of high-use surfaces in the park.
- » Requiring staff to work remotely when possible.
- » Canceling all volunteer events in the park until May 4, per the Governor's [updated non-essential business emergency order](#).
- » Encouraging visitors to the park to follow [Mayor Walsh's April 5 measures](#) for social and physical distancing, including wearing a face covering over their mouth and nose when in public and to stay home from 9p to 6a each day.

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FRIENDS OF CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS PARK

AN OASIS IN THE NEIGHBORHOOD

During this national crisis, the work of the Friends of Christopher Columbus Park volunteers goes on. However, the annual Membership Social and Playground Celebration are canceled. No decision has been made about hosting upcoming events, the Independence Day Celebration, Sunday night movies and Saturday lawn games.

PLAY IN THE PARK

While encouraging social distancing, the Friends invite neighbors to walk through the park, sit on a bench and enjoy the recently created hopscotch board on the path near the Christopher Columbus statue. FOCCP art curator and board member, Robyn Reed, created the colorful hopscotch board with the help of member Meredith Piscitelli. When weather cooperates, Robyn will create another board.

FLOWERS IN BLOOM

Last fall the volunteers planted hundreds of daffodil bulbs that are now in bloom. In addition to the potted plants, 200 pots of Marathon Daffodils were donated to FOCCP on April 17. Masked volunteers set them out along the trellis, at the base of the statue and in front of the bulletin board. Neighbors were invited to take a potted daffodil home after April 21.

LIGHTING THE NIGHT

In years past, the blue lights on the trellis were turned off for the season after Patriots' Day in mid-April. This year FOCCP is keeping the blue lights on until the end of May to light up the night.

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SENATOR JOSEPH BONCORE: WHARF DISTRICT COUNCIL



Since COVID-19 hit Massachusetts, the State Senate has been working to identify ways to support the unique challenges faced by those in our community; families, healthcare workers, restaurant and small business owners, homeowners and renters.

Legislation passed by the Senate and signed into law includes:

- » Eliminating the one-week waiting period for any person making a claim for unemployment benefits, if the unemployment is a result of any circumstances relating to or resulting from the COVID-19 outbreak or the effects of the state of emergency.
 - » Expanding Unemployment Insurance (UI) relief to low-income families, non-profit institutions and employers.
 - » Cancelling the 2020 MCAS.
 - » Extending the state income tax filing deadline for residents.
- » Allowing licensed restaurants to sell certain alcoholic beverages with food take-out and delivery orders.
 - » Addressing disruptions in municipal tax collections and permitting.

The Senate has also passed legislation to provide relief to renters and homeowners through a moratorium on evictions and foreclosures in the Commonwealth, and legislation to expand the scope of practice for certain healthcare professionals to meet current demand. We look forward to seeing these bills also become law.

The Legislature approved \$15 million in funding to address COVID-19, \$5 million of which has gone directly to local Boards of Health.

We understand that our work is not done. Please stay in touch and raise issues that you, your family and your neighborhood are facing. Kindness and community will be the defining characteristic of this moment. In this vein, our Commonwealth will endure as it has endured, we will heal and we will prosper.

Together as friends and neighbors we will get through this! Thank you for your patience and resiliency during what has been a very difficult and challenging time for us all. With the stay at home advisory extended by Governor Baker into May, it is imperative we continue to take the necessary steps to flatten the curve on this virus.

As chairman of the House Ways & Means Committee, I am focused on crafting and passing a balanced state budget that addresses the needs of all the Commonwealth. I am committed to answering the needs of our medical community, health care providers, homeless shelters, education, and child care providers. As this crisis continues, we must protect our most vulnerable citizens.

Let us support one another:

- » Patronize our local restaurants, bakeries and markets by ordering take out and other essential items.
- » Check in on elderly and infirm neighbors.
- » Follow CDC and DPH guidelines.
- » Maintain a hopeful attitude and outlook as we unite in navigating these uncertain times.

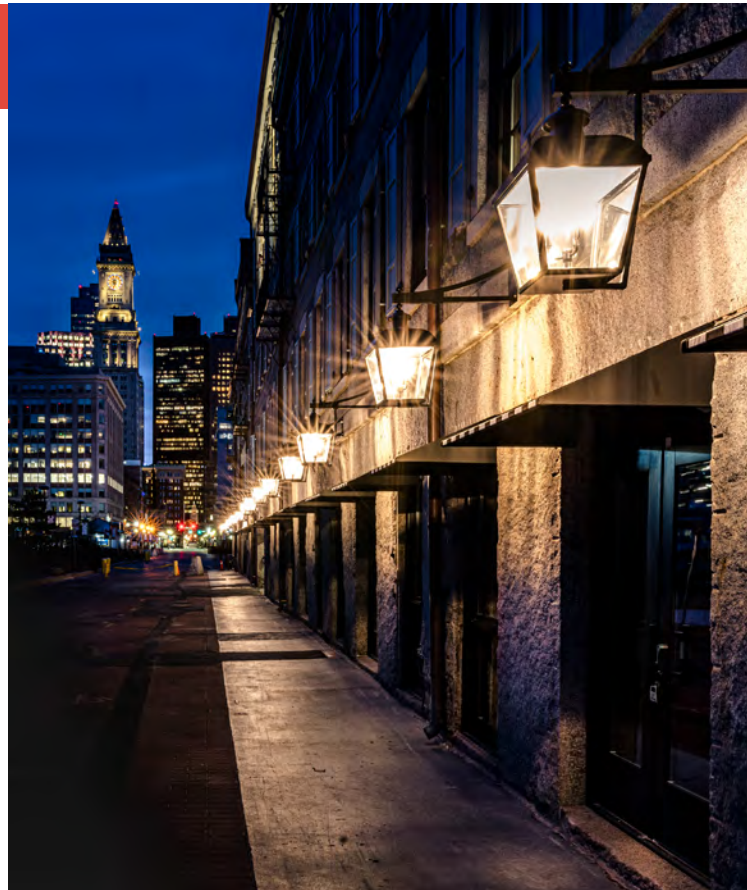

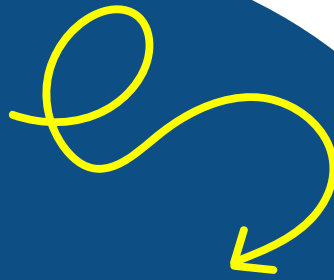

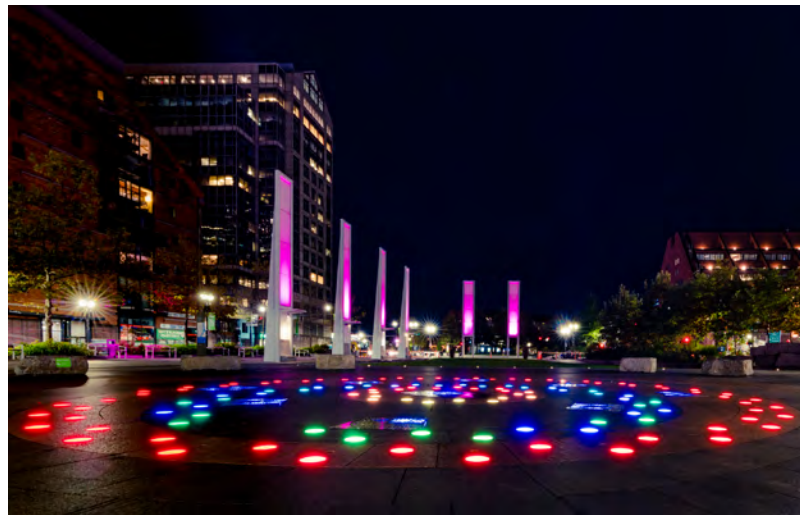
